Out of the blue

Pantone's colour of the year may be classic but it is also full of personality – and forever contemporary

B lue is a constant – the colour of the sky, the ocean and, if you're lucky, perhaps a pair of arresting eyes you can call your own. It's also the most popular colour in the world, and one that is always in style, even when other shades seem to be taking centre stage. (Remember when coffee, latte and mocha were everywhere during the '90s and early 2000s? Thanks, *Friends*!)

It has been part of my palette since I started in design, so it is little surprise that the Pantone Colour of the Year for 2020 is Classic Blue. This soft, medium hue symbolises and instils calm, peace and tranquillity – all necessary traits given the tumultuous start we Australians have had to the new decade.

But it is also a very specific colour – one that works perfectly for summer, as well as coastal interiors. To me, and despite what Pantone's crack team of forecasters, manufacturers, fashion and interiors experts say, it is more than just a trend. Here are a few ideas for making it last in your own home.

• This colour is a beautiful complement to gleaming whites – whether in paint, linens or soft furnishings – and a hint of oak gives the freshness of a breezy beach interior. Semi-opaque sheers cascading

> on a timber floor paired with an occasional chair or couch in the shade finishes the look with a dash of romance.

- Classic blue is a staple
- Add a white coffee table or freshen up an old wooden one with a whitewash application.
